Backdoor cover: When a team scores points at the end of a game to cover the spread unexpectedly.

It's especially used when the betting result is decided late in the game to

change the side that covers the spread.

Beard: Someone who places a wager for another person (aka "runner").

Dog: Short for underdog.

Standard is 10 percent.

Limit: The maximum bet taken by a book.

Some people use it synonymous with "bookmaker" and often the same person will perform the role at a given book, but it can be separate if the oddsmaker

is just setting the lines for the people who will eventually book the bets.

Runner: Someone who makes bets for another person (aka "beard").

news to virtually any media--the "failing" New York Times, NBC, ABC,

Americans believe that the media routinely report fake news, while a Gallup/Knight

Foundation study found that 42 percent of Republicans consider any news stories

that cast a political group or politician in a negative light to be fake news.

The phrase has become so ubiquitous that Washington Post columnist Margaret Sullivan

has argued that it should be discarded because its original meaning--"quo

t;fabricated stories intended to fool you"--has been distorted beyond recog

nition.

Weaponizing the "Fake News" Label

Despite Trump's incendiary tweets calling "the FAKE NEWS media" &

quot;the enemy of the American People," his actual power to take action to c

urtail their activities has, to date, been limited to largely unsuccessful attem
